Creating inclusion is a top priority today.



Peel Region Championing

In 2021, in cooperation with Brampton and Mississauga Officials and their Accessibility Advisory Committees we are in the home stretch of creating a School Pilot for the rest of Ontario and Canada to adopt in the future.

In cooperation with the Peel Region Accessibility Advisory Committee, we think there's an opportunity to do some or all of this too in 2021:

- 1. Treat Accessibly Day amplification on October 7, 2021
 - The first annual Treat Accessibly Day is intended to create National awareness in homeowners across Canada about accessible trick-or-treating and how to participate this Halloween.
- 2. Peel Region Schools adoption of Treat Accessibly Day
 - In partnership with the Rick Hansen Foundation School Program, Teachers in grades 1 through 3 are provided a closed-loop 1-hour lesson plan about accessible inclusion that invites kids to learn in class and then bring the lesson home and practice it at Halloween through Treat Accessibly.





While Halloween may look a little different for many this year, should your family and local government support trick-or-treating in your area, I encourage you to participate in the Treat Accessibility campaign, which has a curb-side trick-or-treating plan to ensure all kids have an accessible and inclusive Halloween experience.

I applaud, #treataccessibility Founder, Rich Padulo for championing an innovative way for kids of all abilities to be included! Our Foundation's School Program is also proud to complement this year's event with inclusive Halloween specific lessons and activities! #halloween #accessibility #inclusion

Peel Region School Boards Update

When writing this document on Sept. 8, 2021:

Peel Region Public Schools reply:

"However, the Peel Board is committed to ensuring a learning environment, through inclusive programs and curriculum, and when we consider PDSB's demographics, many of our students do not celebrate Halloween nor live in homes (structures) that would allow them to participate in Treat Accessibly. That said, the decision was made to not participate in this initiative centrally across the system."

At time of writing this, the city of Brampton was seeking more information to address the decision.

Looking Back To Go Forward

In 2019, Rich was invited to a beautiful experience that changed his life and cemented his family's resolve to grow Treat Accessibly.

A Halloween event at Holland Bloorview Children's Rehabilitation Hospital, where the kids celebrated Halloween in the lobby with volunteers, family and their incredible staff. The joy Rich witnessed was contagious and forever moving.

As you can imagine, many of the kids celebrate this way because they can't Trick-or-Treat with their siblings and other kids due to stairs and other reasons.

In 2021, we can help us change that.

We want to rally a Toronto street that loves Halloween (20-30 houses) to pilot the 1st Treat Accessibly Halloween Village on Saturday Oct. 2, 2021.

With this pilot, Treat Accessibly and our partners would socially share video from the event and excite neighbourhoods across Canada, starting as early as Oct. 7, 2021, to Treat Accessibly at Halloween and help starting to think about championing accessible inclusion for everybody everyday.

RECOMMENDATION

That the site plan for the Peel Regional Paramedic Services Satellite Station identified in the report of the Chief Financial Officer and Commissioner of Corporate Services, listed on the September 16, 2021 Region of Peel Accessibility Advisory Committee agenda titled "Peel Regional Paramedic Services Satellite Station – 11801 Bramalea Road – Site Plan Review", be approved;

And further, that notification of the site plan approval and resolution be provided to the local municipality's Planning and Building Department.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

- The Region of Peel has completed over 15 Peel Regional Paramedic Services (PRPS) Satellite Station site plans with similar design, layout and accessibility features.
- The accessibility features of the PRPS Satellite Stations site plan will meet or exceed applicable legislation and municipal requirements.
- All PRPS Satellite Stations are designed in accordance with the "Peel Regional Paramedic Services Satellite Stations Accessibility Features Checklist".
- The area municipalities' Official Plan allows for the development of an emergency services facility on this property.

DISCUSSION

1. Background

Staff is requesting the Region of Peel Accessibility Advisory Committee (AAC) to review and support the site plan for the PRPS Satellite Station noted in the report and Legislative Services provide notification of the support for the subject site plan to the local municipality Planning and Building Department.

In June 2007, Regional Council endorsed a divisional model for the development of Paramedic facilities through Council Resolution 2007-833. After paramedics are assigned to their vehicles, they are dispatched to satellite stations located throughout the Region of Peel. This allows for vehicles to be pre-positioned in anticipation of emergency calls in a

manner that is based on the deployment plan and decisions made in real time by the Mississauga Central Ambulance Communications Centre.

Satellite stations are approximately 3,000 square feet and are strategically located within the community. These stations are used by paramedics during shifts to work on reports and take breaks in between calls and are generally not visited by members of the public.

The Region of Peel has completed over 15 PRPS Satellite Station site plans with similar design, layout, and accessibility features (as outlined in Table 1). Staff are seeking AAC's review and support of the latest satellite station development located at 11801 Bramalea Road in the City of Brampton. Details of the site plan can be referenced in the presentation material.

2. Accessibility Features

The Region of Peel has incorporated legislative and municipal requirements and best practices for accessibility features into the PRPS Satellite Stations' site plans (as outlined in Table 1).





Figure IV.1.14.1: 360° Curb Ramp




Figure V.6.1.1: Type A Permit Sign








Proposed Floor Plan – Accessible Areas for **Staff**



REPORT TITLE: Accessibility Planning Program Update – September 16, 2021

OBJECTIVE

To provide an update of the activities undertaken by the Region of Peel Accessibility Planning Program and the Accessibility Advisory Committee, subsequent to the May 20, 2021 Accessibility Advisory Committee meeting.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

- The Accessibility Advisory Committee and Accessibility Planning Program have been involved in various activities during this period, which are categorized as follows:
 - o Consultation and compliance support provided to Regional Programs;
 - Participation in community events.
- This report also highlights upcoming events and observances.

DISCUSSION

1. Background

The main objective of the Region of Peel's Accessibility Planning Program (the Program) is to ensure that Regional programs, services and facilities continue to be inclusive and accessible for persons with disabilities. In order to accomplish this objective, the Program works collaboratively with all Regional departments and the Region of Peel Accessibility Advisory Committee (the Committee).

2. Activity List

a) Consultation and Compliance

i) Greater Toronto and Hamilton Area Joint Accessibility Advisory Committee (GTHA AAC) Meeting

- The GTHA AAC held its joint meeting on June 18, 2021.
- This was its first meeting since October 3, 2019 due to the COVID-19 pandemic.
- The GTHA AAC is composed of Chairs and Vice-Chairs of the AACs throughout the GTA and Hamilton as well as representatives from the various transportation services providers including TTC, Metrolinx, Presto, TransHelp, Wheel Trans, etc.

Accessibility Planning Program Update - September 16, 2021

- The objective of the meetings is to share information on the provision of accessible transportation services by the various service providers throughout the GTA and share best practices, challenges and struggles with the objective of an improved transportation system and service experience for persons with disabilities.
- Items discussed at the meeting included: Metrolinx Overview of Projects; Fare and Service Integration; and Updates by each transit service provider.
- Meeting minutes will be shared when they become available.

ii) Hurontario LRT Virtual Overview Session

- On July 27, 2021 Metrolinx held a consultation session with AAC members from the 4 municipalities in Peel.
- The purpose of the session was to provide an accessibility overview of the Hurontario LRT project.
- Substantial completion of the project is targeted for 2024.
- Feedback was requested from AAC members on some of the design elements of the project.
- The presentation highlighted key accessibility features at terminal stops/stations (Brampton Gateway, Port Credit Station), the Mississauga City Centre stop, as well as typical stops along the LRT corridor.
- More information on this project can be found by visiting the Metrolinx website: www.metrolinx.com/hurontarioLRT.

iii) Digital Accessibility Planning

- Staff from Digital Marketing, Service Excellence & Innovation and Accessibility Planning met to discuss collaboration as we move forward with our digital accessibility initiatives.
- The work undertaken to meet legislated website compliance requires different areas of the organization working together more strategically to fulfill our accessibility mandate as it relates to digital accessibility.
- The initial brainstorming session included the following suggestions:
 - Improving the accessibility page on our intranet site one stop shop for all things accessibility.
 - Ensure our 'digital workforce' has an understanding of digital accessibility.
 - o Incorporate accessibility in our digital literacy program.
 - Enhancing the service experience from a client perspective by ensuring accessibility tools and supports are in place.
 - Accessibility training related to specific roles (ie. website content contributors, frontline customer service providers).

iv) 2021 Accessibility Compliance Report

- Every two years the Region of Peel must file an Accessibility Compliance Report
 with the Province which confirms that the Region is in compliance with the
 requirements under the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act, 2005
 (AODA).
- The last compliance report was carried out in 2019.

Accessibility Planning Program Update - September 16, 2021

- Relevant program areas are being consulted for clarification and confirmation of compliance.
- A detailed report of the Region's response will be provided to the Committee at its next AAC meeting.
- The report must be filed by December 31, 2021 deadline.

b) Participation in Community Events

i) National AccessAbility Week (NAAW)

- NAAW was observed form May 30 to June 5, 2021.
- The Region of Peel commemorated the week through a virtual event titled, "Today's Accessibility Experience".
- The objective of the event was to gain a better understanding of how the pandemic has impacted persons with disabilities through testimonies of lived experience.
- Event attendees included Regional staff and community agency partners.
- Keynote speaker Carol-Ann Chafe presented the new reality for persons with disabilities, as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic and discussed gaps and opportunities that have emerged.
- Carol-Ann reiterated the message that everyone has a role to play, as individuals and as community organizations to break down barriers and promote inclusivity in the community.

c) Upcoming Events and Observances

i) National Disability Employment Awareness Month (NDEAM)

- The Region of Peel will be commemorating National Disability Employment Awareness Month in October.
- This observance aims to increase public awareness of the positive outcomes of hiring persons with disabilities in Canada and the positive impact persons with disabilities have when they are employed.
- More information will be shared as planning gets underway.

ii) 2021 International Day of Persons with Disabilities (IDPD)

- As proclaimed by United Nations General Assembly, International Day of Persons with Disabilities (IDPD) is observed annually on December 3rd.
- This day aims to promote the full and equal participation of persons with disabilities and to take action for the inclusion of persons with disabilities in all aspects of society.
- More information on how the Region of Peel will be acknowledging this observance will be shared as the date approaches.
