### **Immediate Regional Priorities**



#### **Infrastructure Funding**

- Increase infrastructure funding to stimulate economic recovery
- Utilize allocation-based models to provide predictability and to distribute funds expeditiously

#### **Housing & Homelessness**

- Provide long-term, flexible, allocation-based, sustainable capital and operational funding for affordable rental housing
- Provide support to prevent the loss of affordable rental housing, through state of good repair funding
- Collaborate with the Region to improve the design and funding of programs (e.g., Reaching Home, Rapid Housing Initiative)

#### **ROP Advocacy Priority**

#### **COVID-19 Response**

- Provide additional funding to offset the substantial incremental costs and loss of revenue associated with the COVID-19 pandemic
- Provide sick pay and other supports for frontline health and essential workers

#### **2021** Provincial Budget

#### **Incremental Costs/Revenue Loss**

- Safe Restart Funding The Region was allocated an additional \$24.6M
- SSRF Phase III \$10.7M for shelter settings and \$528,099 funding for transit.

#### **Public Health**

- Sick pay for essential workers was not addressed
- \$1B as part of Ontario's vaccination plan, beginning in 2020–21
- \$3.7B over 2 years for testing, including \$2.3B in 2021–22, towards a testing strategy
  - \$42M for COVID-19 isolation centres
- \$50M in 2021–22 to ensure IPAC resources are available across Ontario

#### **ROP Advocacy Priority**

#### **Mental Health & Addictions**

- Address historical funding inequities for Peel mental health and addictions services
- Implement an equitable funding model to ensure funding matches community needs and reflects demographic changes

#### Long Term Care & Support for Seniors

- Ensure that base funding better matches staffing resources to resident with complex care needs
- Fund dedicated staff training in support of emotionally-focused and person-centred care
- Provide funding for modernized and comprehensive build projects (Peel Manor) <sup>5-11</sup>

#### 2021 Provincial Budget

- \$175M in 2021–22 as part of the investment of \$3.8B over 10 yrs
- Framework to identify core services available (Roadmap to Wellness)
- \$7M to help postsecondary students during COVID-19
- 4 new mobile mental health clinics
- Added supports for OPP
- \$933M over 4 yrs (\$2.6B) for 30,000 new LTC beds – includes 4 projects in Peel
- \$246M over 4 yrs to improve living conditions
- \$650M in continued support for LTC during pandemic
- Reaffirmed Long-Term Care Staffing Plan (Dec. 2020)

#### **ROP Advocacy Priority**

#### Early Years & Child Care System

- Continue to provide funding throughout 2021 and into 2022 for Peel child care providers impacted by COVID-19
- Phase-in or delay proposed administrative funding reductions
- Provide additional funding to maintain service levels for families and providers are supported
- Continue to provide Service System Managers with flexibility and fewer funding envelopes to reduce administrative burden

#### 2021 Provincial Budget

- Proposes a 20% top-up to the Childcare Access and Relief from Expenses (CARE) tax credit for 2021
- This increases support for parents from \$1,250 to \$1,500, on average
- Total support provided by this temporary top-up would be about \$75M
- Did not include new measures to address child care system challenges

### **Other Notable Investments**

#### **Health Care System**

- \$30.2B over the next 10 years for hospital infrastructure. This includes significant new investments in Peel:
  - A complete rebuild of the Mississauga hospital in partnership with Trillium Health Partners
  - William Osler Health System will receive funding for Peel Memorial Phase 2 redevelopment, with construction of a new inpatient wing
  - \$125M to fund over 500 critical care and high intensity hospital beds in areas with high rates of COVID-19 transmission
- An additional \$602.2M in 2021–22 in the Ontario Public Drug Program
- Support for Ryerson University to plan a proposal for a new medical education institute in Brampton
- The Province reiterates the need for the federal share of the Canada Health Transfer to at least 35%

- Distributing Provincial funding and works under the legislation in the Child Care and Early Years Act

### **Benefits**


- Non-profit and for-profit providers
- Centre-based and licensed home child care
- Families who need fee subsidy
- Children with special needs

- Each dollar invested returns \$3-10 in terms of savings and benefits
- Essential to the physical and mental health and well being of families and children
- A driver of economic recovery
- Supports other Regional priorities

### **COVID Impact** Timeline



- April 2020 New Health and Safety Protocols for ECC
- June 2020 New Health and Safety Protocols for Licensed Child Care
- September 2020 Refined Health and Safety Protocols for BASP
- December 2020 Enhanced Health and Safety Protocols
- February Enhanced Health and Safety protocols (screening and masking)

### Impact of Provincial Funding Cuts in 2021 & 2022

### 2021

Download of 50% of administrative expenses to the Region

Impact: \$5M

Council approved \$1.2M to address this impact



### 2022

Remaining impact of cost share from 2021: \$3.8M

Further reductions in 2022: \$3.7M

Total: **\$7.5M**

### Potential Impacts in 2022

- Fee subsidy waiting list
- Special needs resourcing wait list
- Less accountability
- Fewer future efficiencies
- Reduced system planning
- Reduced ability to fund Regional Shared Services
- Less support for providers
- Less agility to respond to change



# ADVOCACY IN 2021

# Fair share funding for Peel

- Eliminate proposed administrative funding reductions planned for 2022
- Ensure that COVID funding is prioritized and based on the impact of the pandemic (case counts, number of days in red/grey/lockdown, vulnerability of residents)
- Eliminate "Capping Adjustment" to recoup \$4M that should be coming to Peel
- Ensure Peel has a voice in the revised funding formula to ensure Peel's unique needs are addressed
- Maintain Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA)

#### This will:

- Avoid service cuts to fee subsidy and special needs
- Allow us to continue to support providers and families
- Ensure Peel residents benefit from funding they deserve

### **Predictable**, **Flexible Funding**

- Multi-year funding
- Flexibility to meet cost savings targets and needs of community
- Cut red tape
  - fewer funding envelopes and streamlined reporting will reduce admin costs
  - will allow providers focus on quality care not paperwork

#### This will allow for:

- More efficient, multi-year planning that makes best use of taxpayer dollars
- Increased efficiencies
- Providers focus on quality care vs red tape
- Greater innovation and better solutions
- Programs tailored to community needs

### **Ongoing Viability Funding for Providers**

- Child sector in Peel is at risk and without support, some providers may not survive
- Ensure that providers survive so there is sufficient child care after the pandemic
- CEWS and CERS extended to end of 2021

#### This will:

- Ensure stability of child care sector in Peel
- Ensure families in Peel have access to safe, quality child care
- Keep women in the workforce
- Avoid small businesses from going out of business

### Strategy for Registered Early Childhood Educators

- Recruitment & retention was a serious problem
   *before* the pandemic more critical now
- Pandemic has been hard on sector
- Recent survey of Peel RECEs
  - 86% experiencing increased stress
  - 72% are considering leaving the sector
- Need a provincial strategy including:
  - Funding parity with their school board RECEs
  - Wage enhancement grants for EarlyON staff
  - Recognition for the profession

#### This will allow for:

- Quality of care for children
- Stability of the system
- Greater equity for all RECEs
- Better outcomes for Peel children
