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

Weekly COVID-19 incidence rates by Peel municipality: May 31, 2020 to May 8, 2021




Report week (start date)

Rates across Peel have started to decline.


Case counts remain extremely high.

Age-specific COVID-19 incidence rates by 10-year age group, Peel




Incidence rates are decreasing across most age groups


New admissions and critical care admissions among COVID-19 patients

Continued hospital transfers across Ontario


A larger proportion COVID-19 cases require hospitalization as a result of infection with variants of concern

Continued need for public health measures


- Provincial stay-at-home order after May 19th
 - Current Peel rates exceed rates when stay-at-home order came into effect
- Section 22 Workplace Order and workplace dismissals in Peel will continue post May 19th
- Discussions with the province:
 - School reopening
 - Public health measures

Vaccination program updates

Total doses administered: 716,566	50% of Peel eligible residents aged 18+ have received their first dose	Vaccination rate Vaccinating 125k residents every 7 days
Eligibility: All Peel residents (18+)	Targeted Approaches: 30 community clinics completed/planned	Doses After Dark (32-hr vaccine clinic)

Percent of Peel residents who have received at least one dose of COVID-19 vaccine as of May 11, 2021




As of May 11, **71%** of Peel residents 50+ have received at least one dose

Over the past two weeks there have been large increases in the number of residents aged 40-64 receiving their first dose



WHAT WE ARE DOING

STRATEGIES:

- Leveraging social influencers and group norming *local community figures and social media networks*
- Offering safe and trusted spaces targeted mobile clinics (e.g., faith-based and community-based)
- * Increasing outreach efforts Community Ambassadors, local faces, multi-lingual, representative of the community
- * Making vaccination easy increased access, clinic hours, transportation options, targeted communications
- Debunking myths and misinformation Communication materials and tactics designed to address misinformation

Priorities

- Continued need for a stable and sufficient vaccine supply, in order to:
 - Reach 75% first dose coverage goal by end of May
 - Vaccinate 12-17 years of age population
 - Administer second doses
- Maintain mass clinic capacity
- Increasing focus on hard to reach and residents with low vaccine confidence
- Continued need for public health measures
