Watershed 2021

\$5,221,900 42 Projects

Outputs

- Collect monitoring data on over 140 species and vegetation monitoring plots across TRCA's jurisdiction
- Embankment and reservoir maintenance at 4 large dams
- Treat and monitor approximately 50 trees with TreeAzin to protect against Emerald Ash Borer
- Remove and abate 1,500 trees to ensure public safety on all TRCA lands within Peel Region.
- Conduct hazard tree inventory, monitoring, and mapping for 35 kilometres of trail and 63 kilometres of TRCA-owned boundary lands
- Remove 2,000 lbs of garbage from waterways; restore & enhance 10,000 square metres of greenspace at watershed clean-up events

- Facilitate 15 transactions/exchanges through the Pearson Eco-Business Material Exchange Program
- Implement the Bramalea SNAP Action Plan and West Bolton SNAP Residential Retrofit Program

- Provide over 22,500 learner hours for Region of Peel teachers, elementary and secondary students
- Invasive species management plans for Heart Lake, Albion Hills and Claireville Conservation Area are underway.

Outputs

- Monitoring and assessment of property conditions and infrastructure on over 4,000 hectares of conservation lands
- Design and procurement for the replacement of the existing office/workshop and equipment storage facility at Albion Hills Conservation Area
- Complete comprehensive building and infrastructure condition assessments and continuity reserve plans for facilities including Claireville and Glen Haffy Conservation Parks
- Acquire 80 hectares of property in hazard, conservation, and environmentally significant lands across TRCA's jurisdiction
- Ongoing construction of TRCA administrative office; substantial completion is expected by Q4 2022

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

Risks in Achieving Council's Direction

- TRCA is currently reviewing the Conservation Authorities Act Phase 1 Regulatory Proposal Consultation Guide to provide comment on or before June 27
- TRCA is working to develop and implement MOUs/SLAs with partner municipalities and lower-tier municipalities to deliver the TRCA services they require
 - Local municipalities have expressed interest in understanding and procuring TRCA services
 - Holding meetings with municipalities to highlight need for SLAs, discuss priority projects and opportunities, and identify needed amendments to procurement policies
 - TRCA has developed a template MOU, SLA, municipal Council report, and a detailed list of TRCA services
 - TRCA is beginning work on the transition plan required by the Province by end of 2021 and will engage the Region and local municipalities as needed.
- TRCA is responding and adapting on an ongoing basis to Provincial announcements and direction related to COVID-19
 - Conservation Areas are re-opening, while summer day camps have been canceled
 - Education programs have adapted where possible to provide virtual learning opportunities

Residual Impacts of Pandemic and Recovery

TRCA's operating budget and more specifically, authority generated revenue, is most heavily impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic.

- TRCA continues to mitigate financial impacts during the ongoing pandemic through expenditure reductions and ongoing monitoring of authority generated revenue
- Staff hope to see more parks and facilities permitted to safely open in 2022, but are prepared to offer opportunities for passive use, if required by public health conditions
- Enhanced Health and Safety procedure have been successfully integrated into our work and will continue for the foreseeable future
- Staff will continue to offer virtual programming and are preparing to offer in-person programming when conditions allow. Additionally, staff are in discussions with area school boards to begin to plan for a safe reintroduction of class field trips when appropriate and public health conditions permit, with day field trips anticipated in late 2021 and overnight excursions in 2022
