2020 Accomplishments

OUTPUTS

- Acquisition of Town of Caledon unopened road allowances within Belfountain Conservation Area
- 899 property enquiries, Sec 28 permits, planning files and EAs reviewed, meeting permit timelines >95% of the time and achieving an 'excellent' customer satisfaction rating of 97%
- Island Lake Management Plan stakeholder input gathered
- Monitored 42 stream sites, 6 forest sites, 18 wetland sites and 14 groundwater sites
- Planted 52,850+ trees and shrubs across the watershed
- 266 hectares inventoried for forest management plans
- Issued 19 watershed safety and flood statements
- Completed floodplain mapping for 3 watercourses in Mississauga.

- Held 150 consultations with landowners; supported 58 private land stewardship projects
- Finalized and initiated the Hungry Hollow SNAP, engaging over 500 residents
- Completed biological inventory in 10 natural areas covering 216 hectares, characterizing 54 vegetation communities and observing over 4,400 species
- Developed new landscape connectivity models and mapping
- Monitored and shared outcomes for stormwater management design and performance
- Propagated 77,198 trees and shrubs at Warwick Nursery
- Monitored 74 restoration and management projects
- With input from over 40 municipal, CA and NCO partners, developed an extensive database for life-cycle costing data for natural assets (lawns, trees, streams, wetlands, meadows and forests) in Peel.










