IDENTIFIED PARAMETERS - FOOD SECURITY FUNDING 2022 - 2023 \$4ML REGIONAL INVESTMENT

- 1. **Food Bank Eligibility** The grant will be Inclusionary to all formal and informal food banks regardless of size in the Region of Peel Food Ecosystem as specified below.
 - Capital funding Priority will be provided to Food banks with great reach.

Definition(s): **Food Bank**—a not-for-profit that collects product from the food industry and food drives, inventories and stores it, and distributes it to agencies—such as food pantries, community meal programs and kitchens, breakfast programs—that provide food directly to individuals in need. A food bank has the capacity to distribute millions of pounds of grocery product every year. Food banks make it easy for agencies to obtain nutritious food at low cost in the quantities they need for their clients. (cited from—Second Harvest)

Food System in Peel Players

Food Distribution in Peel- a formalized food distribution system is set up in Peel through Feed Ontario. Feed Ontario works to distribute food and unite local food banks to eradicate hunger and poverty. Feed Ontario has a network of around 130 direct member food banks and supports over 1,100 affiliated members across Ontario. The municipal Feed Ontario members for Peel are: 1) Mississauga-The Mississauga Food Bank; 2) Brampton – Knights Table; 3) Caledon – The Exchange. Each of the Peel Food Ontario members than distribute food to affiliated members throughout Peel.

There is also an informal system of food distribution with programs and service delivery models that is comprised of non-Feed Ontario members within Peel that is made up of interfaith and grassroots agencies.

1. Application process

- Aligned to Regional community Investment Program principles: accountability, transparency, openness, equity, diversity, and inclusion.
- Applications open to all Food banks in the Region of Peel
- Aligned Phase 2 of Emergency COVID-19 Funding
- Transparent Regional application process that is sent out to all food banks in the Region of Peel (Brampton, Mississauga, Caledon).
- Distributed through Regional Community Investment Program (online Gov Grants portal).
- 2. Equity maximize the value of tax dollars invested in Region Peel Food Banks (Mississauga, Brampton, Caledon)
 - the grant will institute a balanced funding approach to ensure an equitable process of dissemination of funds between all 3 municipalities with no one agency/municipality receiving the full yearly budget of the grant (2MI).
 - Maximum Grant per agency per year \$500,000.
 - Regional risk and compliance measure All grants will not exceed more than 20% of agencies total yearly - revenue to a maximum of \$500,000.
 - All grants will require to adhere to performance conditions specified in a Regional funding service agreement that can be subject to an audit.
 - All grants will have to demonstrate value for money and impact on food insecurity in Peel for low income residents, municipal population and increased population growth.

- 12.8 percent (12.8%) or 175,980 residents are living in poverty
- The rate of poverty is 16 percent (16%) for racialized (visible minority) communities; this is higher than the regional and provincial averages
- 18 percent (18%) of Peel's children 0 to 17 years live in poverty
- 45 percent (45%) of renters spend more than 30 per cent of their income on shelter costs
- Between 2009 and 2016, the cost to feed a family of four per week increased by 26 percent to \$197 per week
- In July 2020, the unemployment rate within Peel doubled to 16.3 percent (16.3%)
- The Peel youth unemployment rate reached a record high of approximately 38.6 percent (38.6%) as of July 2020

3. Cost Inclusion

- Capital Costs due to COVID-19 Pressures to increase food security reach -1) Large Capital Costs;
 Example- Storage facilities, Refrigeration Equipment, Construction, Renovation repairs, IT systems. 2) Small Capital costs; Example commercial grade appliances, steam tables, chest freezers.
- Unbudgeted Operational Costs due to COVID-19 Pressures to increase food security reach—1) increased staff to support delivery methods; 2) increased staff to support warehouse and storage facilities.
- Operational Expenses unbudgeted expenses the food bank incurs due to increase pressures from COVID-19. (i.e. rent, equipment, evaluation).
- Ineligible Costs Contributions to annual funding drives and capital campaigns; Activities completed, or costs incurred prior to the approval of the grant application; Taxes, such as GST and HST, for which the recipient is eligible for a tax rebate, and all other costs eligible for rebates; Contingency costs are not eligible expenses
