




Well-managed farmland in each local region:

- 1) Allows excess water to infiltrate
- 2) Filters water for surrounding urban areas
- 3) Provides habitat for biodiversity
- 4) Sequesters carbon dioxide
- 5) Has a local bio-physical cooling effect
- 6) Provides food and fibre with a base for local food security



- Classes 1, 2 and 3 dependable ag land or prime farmland;
 needed for stable yields, especially as climate changes
- Classes 4, 5, 6 and 7 constraints for ag and lower yields;
 still filters water, provides habitat for bio-diversty
- Preserve wetlands and prime farmland for ag, regardless of location in Ontario
- Ontario loses 175 acres of farmland and productive ag soil every day https://ontariofarmlandtrust.ca/

- Yields will drop when climate perturbations cause local weather variations of too much or too little moisture at the wrong times, or temperatures that are too high or too low at the wrong times.
- In 40 yrs, synthetic fertilizer use increased 5 to 7 times, while global food production went up 2 times
