
Appendix II - Advocacy to Support Investment in Peel's Mental Health and Addictions System Region of Peel Mental Health Profile

"1 in 5 people in Peel Region will experience a mental health concern at some point in their lifetime."¹


In 2020, there were **19,285 ED visits** for mental health-related disorders among individuals living in Peel.²

In 2016, **depression** was the most prevalent mental health disorder, with an estimated, **53,000 cases**³

Peel Mental Health Organizations⁵

There are approximately **140** organizations within Peel serving the population.*

Poor transitions from youth to adult mental health services lead to disengaging from care in up to 60% of known cases.⁴



Using the 2019 LHIN community mental health and addiction program transfer payment allocations ⁶ along with the projected 2019 populations,⁷ per capita funding was calculated to be \$48 and \$36 for Central West and Mississauga Halton LHINs, respectively. By contrast, per capita funding for community mental health and addiction program in 2019 was \$80 for Ontarians.

Adult Child Child In 2019, **11.9%** of individuals In 2019, **11.9%** of individuals who accessed care for a mental illness **had 3 or more repeat hospitalizations**.⁸
