


Transition of the Blue Box Program to Full Producer Responsibility – June 2020 Update: Preferred Transition Year

Ministry Consultation Update

- Preliminary Proposals by the Ministry:
 - Wide swath of materials will be designated (from newspapers to flower pots to stir sticks to compostable packaging)
 - Producers must meet recovery targets for broad categories but not for individual materials
 - Producers to collect from retirement homes and long term care facilities but not from parks, public spaces and schools
 - Producers must provide collection services to residents free of charge
 - Producers must provide curbside collection receptacles for free
 - Regulation will require promotion and education (P&E) during transition but not post transition (i.e. after December 31, 2025)

Transition Options Methodology

- Staff considered multiple options and narrowed down to three logical options for more detailed evaluation:
 - January 1, 2023; October 1, 2024; October 1, 2025
- Staff conducted a scenario modelling exercise, considering:
 - The above transition dates
 - Whether or not Peel provides collection services
 - Various other assumptions including:
 - Early termination costs
 - Producer contribution level (% of Peel's costs paid by Producers)

Evaluation Criteria

- Staff used evaluation criteria endorsed by Committee:
 - Financial: evaluates the revenue and expenditure implications of the multiple scenarios
 - Control Over Operational Decisions and Customer Service Levels: evaluates the pros and cons that residents may experience from Peel having all, some or no control over service delivery
 - System Integration and Other Risks: evaluates the major benefits and challenges stemming from the integration of the options with the Region's other waste services

Transition Options (1)

• Option 1 – January 1, 2023 transition

- Peel could realize approximately \$5-\$25 million in net savings and avoided costs for the 21 month period from January 1, 2023 until October 1, 2024, then approximately \$15 million per year in net savings and avoided costs
- Degree of savings and risk are dependent on whether the Region is able to provide collection service to Producers
- If Peel provides service:
 - Peel would still have control over the service level and quality of services
- If Region does not provide service:
 - Peel would not have control over the service level and quality of services
 - Requires amendment or early termination of curbside collection contracts

Transition Options (2)

• Option 2 – October 1, 2024 transition

- Peel could realize up to approximately \$15 million per year in net savings and avoided costs beginning October 1, 2024
- Coincides with end of collection contracts
- Simplest and least disruptive
- Does not require amendments or termination of major contracts
- Gives Peel control of collection for first 21 months of 3-year transition period
- Can learn from experience of those who transition in 2023

Transition Options (3)

• Option 3 – October 1, 2025 transition

- Peel could realize up to approximately \$15 million per year in net savings and avoided costs beginning October 1, 2025
- Latest practical transition date
- With collection contract extensions, this option extends the time that Peel would have control over collections until almost the end of the transition period (i.e. until October 1, 2025)
- Provides extra year to learn from others

Risks and Unknowns

- Language of draft or final regulation
- Whether Producers will expect service level changes
- Whether Producers will use the Region for collection services

Preferred Transition Date

- October 1, 2024
- The simplest and least disruptive date
- Coincides with end of current collection contracts and avoids the financial and operational implications of early contract terminations
- Waiting until this date provides 21 months for the Region to learn from already transitioned municipalities before making changes in Peel
