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# Importance of Oral Health



conditions

- Oral health is an important component of overall health and quality of life
  - Dental diseases are largely preventable chronic diseases

### **Oral Health in Peel**

- 15% of residents rate their oral health as fair or poor
- 30% of residents do not visit a dental provider annually
- 37% of Kindergarten and Grade 2 students have experienced tooth decay




## **Limited Oral Health Care Access**



- Residents without private insurance or an ability to pay are less likely to access dental care.
  - Seniors
  - People with low income
  - New immigrants

#### Public Health Prevention of Dental Disease




**Figure 1** - Three types of public health prevention interventions

## Children's Oral Health Program

- Free dental services for eligible children
  - Preventive dental services
  - Dental screening
  - Case management
- 101,000 children screened in 2019
  - 11% had an urgent need
  - 51% required teeth cleaning, sealants, and fluoride
- Gradual reopening as Public Health transitions out of the pandemic response



## **Seniors Oral Health Program**



- Expansion of the Ontario
  Seniors Dental Care Program
  infrastructure in Peel:
  - Additional CHC operatories
  - Seniors Health and Wellness
     Village at Peel Manor
  - Three new dental clinics in Mississauga and Brampton
  - Mobile dental clinic

## **New Canadian Dental Care Plan**

- Increasing equitable access to dental care
- Phase 1 Canada Dental Benefit (December 2022)
  - Children <12 years old</li>
- Phase 2 Lower-income, uninsured individuals (end of 2023)
  - Children <18 years of age</li>
  - Seniors 65+ years of age
  - Individuals with disabilities
